


Newsletter 15 18/01/2019

Dear Parents,



This week we have been up to our eyes in all things mathematical as it has been Maths Week. The focus, across the school, has been on problem solving and in particular developing reasoning skills so children can select and use and apply a range of skills when facing maths problems and make decisions and choices to solve tricky questions. All the classes have been busy with a different activities that involve picking out clues from questions and puzzles to help them get started, finding all the different combinations of answers there might be and using key vocabulary to explain how they know. Make sure you look in your child's book for the maths week activities at the Open Classroom event next week to see just what has been happening. Thank you to Mrs Williams, our Maths subject leader, for coordinating such a great event.

On Monday I held an assembly for the children in Years 1-6, to explain a new system that we have introduced to record *Achievement Points* and *Behaviour Points*. Achievement Points will be a replacement for House Points and teachers will keep an electronic record of how many

each child receives and what the points are awarded for. If they achieve 25 points, they will receive a Bronze certificate, with a Silver certificate for 50 and a Gold certificate for 100. I also spoke to them about how if they receive a yellow or red card for behaviour this would be recorded too, with 1 behaviour point for a yellow card and 5 for a red but reassured them that this was not something to worry about. We focused on the positives of receiving an achievement point, and how recording them will help us celebrate, and keep a record of, the great things they all do. At the end of each term we will announce which House has the most achievement points that term and the winning house will receive a special treat.





We seem to have had a lot of birthdays recently and a number of children have asked if they can hand out treats to their class to celebrate. Whilst not wanting to be 'killjoys', this isn't something we would want to encourage with all the concerns about children's sugar intake and also as we are a 'Healthy School'. We are always happy to celebrate a child's special day and would like to remind parents of the Birthday Book system that we have had running since the school opened. If they would like to, on their birthday, a child can donate a book to the class Book Corner to share with their friends and we will stick a special bookplate into the book to commemorate their special day.

It is always tricky on the dark mornings in January to climb out of bed but since we have returned after the Christmas break we have noticed an increasing number of children coming in through the front entrance as the gates have been closed. It is

important that the children learn the importance of punctuality as it is a life skill for them. We would therefore ask for your support in making sure the children arrive promptly at 8.45am, the official school start time, and come through the classroom door with the rest of the class, as this makes sure they have a settled start to the day and are ready to begin their learning.



Finally, can I remind parents of children in KS2 about the Reading Workshop being held on 5th February at 6.30pm for parents of children in Years 3 to 6. There is further information about this later in the newsletter, but please do 'save the date' as it will be really useful in helping parents support their child's reading skills and is something that a number of parents have requested. Mrs Del Medico, our English leader, and Mrs Hall, our Reading Recovery teacher, have some excellent ideas to share and have worked very hard on planning a really interesting session. Please send in the attached slip or email Mrs Pereira on info@southfield-park.surrey.sch.uk so we know how many people to accommodate. There will be a workshop for KS1 parents later in the term.






Attendance this week

Attendance

I wanted to take the opportunity to remind everyone that our Attendance Policy clearly states that holidays during term time will not be authorised unless in truly exceptional circumstances. Our full Attendance Policy is available both online on the website and also as a paper copy in the office.

The Education Welfare Service, acting on behalf of Surrey County Council may issue a Penalty Notice as an alternative to the prosecution of a parent/carer for their child's unauthorised absence from school and requires the recipient to pay a fixed amount.

The amount payable on issue of a Penalty Notice is £60 per child, per parent, if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice, rising to £120 if paid after 21 days but within 28 days.

If the Penalty Notice is not paid within 28 days, the Local Authority must prosecute the parent/carer for failing to ensure regular school attendance under Section 444 Education Act 1996.

Circumstances when a Penalty Notice may be issued to parents/carers

- Where parents/carers are failing to secure their child's regular school attendance and are failing to engage with supportive measures to improve attendance proposed by the school or Education Welfare Officer a penalty notice may be issued.
- Where a child is taken out of school for an unauthorised leave of absence during term time for 5 days or more without the authority of the head teacher, **each** parent/carer is liable to receive a penalty notice for **each** child. In these circumstances, a warning will not be given where it can be shown that parents/carers had previously been warned that such absences would not be authorised.
- Where children are identified by Police and Education Welfare Officers engaged on Truancy Patrols and who have previously incurred unauthorised absences.
- Where attendance has fallen below 90% and there are no less than 7 unauthorised sessions during the preceding six school weeks. The parent/carer failure to engage with supportive measures proposed by the school or Education Welfare will be a factor when considering the issue of a Penalty Notice. Unauthorised absence will include late arrival after the close of registration without good reason.



Reading Comprehension Workshop

On Tuesday 5th February, at 6.30p.m, we will be holding a Reading Comprehension workshop for key stage 2 (Years 3-6) parents.

During the workshop, we will share with you some of the different strategies that we are using in school to develop the children's comprehension skills, enabling them to become 'active' readers. Developing these comprehension skills not only increases the pleasure and effectiveness of reading but also helps in many other subjects across the curriculum such as reasoning and problem solving in Maths.

All the practical approaches that we will share with you can be used to support your child at home.

We do hope that you will be able to join us—please complete and return the slip below so we know how many people to expect.



Nasty Normans

Saturday 9 February 2019 1pm to 2.30pm



Relive the Battle of Hastings and discover the Norman skill of castle building using props from the Tower of London. After the death of a childless King and a struggle between claimants to the throne in 1066, the year of the three battles, Duke William was the last man standing. Harold died with an arrow in his eye or did he? To control the country William and his Barons began building castles, first of earth and timber, and then stone. Built as fortresses, they became administration centres and symbols of power for the Nasty Normans.
