Dear Parents,

Phew! What a busy past couple of weeks we have had as we countdown to the end of term and the finale to another great year at Southfield Park.

Last week the school was full of budding scientists as we held our annual Science Week in school. The teachers all planned exciting science activities in lessons to spark the children's curiosity as well as there being many other opportunities across the school to develop scientific thinking. One of the most popular events of the week was the Science Fair on Friday when each class set up a stall in the hall to share an exciting experiment they had conducted in the classroom. Each class had the chance to visit and try out something new and there were peals of laughter and many gasps of amazement as the children tried the experiments out. Thank you to Mrs Greenacre, who leads on science, who organised the whole week. Thank you too to all the children who entered the science competition by designing an experiment. The entries were simply amazing and the winners from each class were displayed at the Science Fair. It was so difficult to judge as all the entries were superb but the winners were: Arlo in Goldsworthy for Phase 1, Rory in Nightingale for Phase 2 and Merryn in Newton for Phase 3. Well done to them and everyone who entered.





The District Sports Athletics events were held last Thursday and Friday for years 3 to 6 and we were very pleased to have come in third place overall with some amazing performances from individual children as well as a fabulous overall team effort as every competitor in a race secures points for the school. What makes the result especially good is that for the field events on Thursday the year 5 children had to represent both Year 5 and Year 6, as Year 6 were out at their Chessington World of Adventures trip. Some of the Year 5 children even won against Year 6 counterparts! Thank you to all the members of staff who accompanied the children and all the parents who came along to support.

As always, it was a pleasure to see so many parents at our Parent Consultation Meetings last week and those parents of children in Year 6 who had to wait for their meetings until this week as we were awaiting the arrival of the Key Stage 2 SATs results. At the end of the school year, it is great to celebrate each child's individual successes with parents and I hope parents found them useful and informative. Those of you that were lucky enough to come along to our Phase 3 production of Peter Pan on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings will I am sure agree with me what a terrific show it was. The children all did us really proud! There were some simply wonderful performances from the main cast members and it is always wonderful to see some unexpected stars rising through and showing us how much confidence they have developed since joining us. I must thank them all for learning their lines so well and having the bravery to stand up on stage a deliver them with so much poise. What is always so great about these performances, though, is how they include as many children as possible within the Phase, and it is contributions of every single child that come together to make the show so impressive, so whatever a child's role we are proud of them all. Thank you to all the staff who gave up their time for rehearsals and preparation of resources to make the show a success and to Miss David who was the mastermind behind the production. From past experience I am sure she is already thinking about next year's show!

As you know, anti-social behaviour in and around the park adjacent to the school is a concern for the whole school community, as is the parking at drop off and pick up



times. Last week Mrs Crawford and I attended a Joint Action Group (JAG) meeting with members of staff from Epsom and Ewell Borough Council and the Police to discuss the issues we face and some potential solutions. They listened carefully to our concerns and have promised more frequent, unannounced parking attendant visits to try and stop the inconsiderate and dangerous parking that we regularly experience as well as increased police presence to discourage anti-social behaviour. We have been advised that there will be increased numbers of police officers available in Epsom and Ewell officers in the future. It was also confirmed that the park wardens, who are uniformed and wear body cameras, will be making more frequent visits to try to limit the anti-social behaviour and casual drug use that parents report to us. What they have requested is that parents or other members of the local community report to the police every occurrence of anti-social behaviour they see as their resourcing is based upon numbers of reports and the more reports they get the greater priority will be applied to the area. Please can we therefore urge you to report anything you see using the link below. Although you may not receive any notification back, all of the reports add to the statistics






Attendance this week

Science Rocks!

Last Friday was the yearly science fair where each year group goes down to the hall to take part in some fun science experiments.

There were a variety of experiments such as balloon tricks (including three parts with the theme of positive and negative particles) and Marvellous Marbles, an

activity where you roll a marble down a ramp and then travels on different surfaces like grass, tin foil and carpet.

Jacob Coen in year 3 stated "My favourite experiment was the balloon trick, when I put a pin on the balloon it popped but when I put tape on the balloon and put the pin on the tape the balloon didn't pop."

Also, Millie Florence in year 4 said "My favourite activity was about bubbles where people lifted a hoop around me and made one giant bubble because the hoop was covered in a mix of fairy liquid and water."

All in all, it has been an exciting day of scientific investigations!

Rosebery School visited Year 6 this week to give Year 6 a glimpse of Secondary School Science. The girls from the Science Club told us about some of the projects that they have done this year, including an investigation into which metals are inside a mobile phone. It was interesting to look inside different types of phone and to chat to the Year 7s.

We then took part in a crime-busting investigation ourselves, using chromatography to work out which pen was used to forge a cheque!

At the end, we watched a demonstration of a chemical reaction to make elephant's toothpaste. It was explosive!

Signs on Hook Rd say the work is due to start week commencing 22nd July

Notification of major gas works: Hook Road, Epsom

We are writing to make you aware of a forthcoming upgrade to our gas network on Hook Road, Epsom. Our project involves the essential replacement of old metal gas mains with new plastic pipe to ensure we continue to provide a safe and reliable gas supply to the local area. Our contractor KTL will undertake this work on our behalf.

In agreement with Surrey County Council, our project will start on **Thursday 25 July and last approximately six** weeks.

For everyone's safety, we need to close Hook Road to motorists in both directions between its junctions with Chase Road and Woodstock Close. We have planned to carry out this work during the school summer holiday, when roads are typically quieter, to minimise disruption to the local community.

Signed diversion routes will be in place for northbound and southbound traffic. We will need to implement a one-way system along Hook Road, Chase Road, Temple Road and Pound Lane will be made one way. An alternative diversion route will be setup for HGVs while the road is closed. HGVs should follow our signed diversions via Reigate Road, College Road, Alexandra Road, Upper High Street and Church Street.

Vehicles can continue to access the multi-storey car park opposite the Woodstock Close junction during our six-week project. Pedestrian access to properties and businesses along Hook Road will be maintained throughout.

We understand that roadworks can be frustrating. However, the new plastic pipe has a minimum lifespan of 80 years. This means that when the work is complete, Epsom residents will continue to enjoy the benefits of a safe and reliable gas supply for years to come.

Wellbeing Week

Thursday: Teachers will be sharing Wellbeing stories and lessons with their classes

Friday: 'Mix it up Friday', children will be able to pick from a range of activities including cricket, cheerleading, creative writing, chess, pond dipping, karate and the very popular pamper parlour.

Friday is also a mufti day and children should wear comfy clothes ready for the afternoon workshops. In return, we are asking for a £1 donation which will be donated to the 52 lives project. This project works with thousands of children every year as part of their School of Kindness. Their workshops hope to empower children by helping them realise that the little choices they make every day can make a big difference to the world. Children in Years 2 and 3 will need to come into school in their School Uniform and bring a change of clothes for after the Summer Celebration Performance.
