Dear Parents,

This week we have been have been celebrating Black History in school, recognising the importance of black culture and thinking about the achievements of black people nationally and internationally. The theme has been 'Firsts', remembering not just the most famous black people to have achieved great things, such as Rosa Parks and Barack Obama, but valuing the enormous contributions of other citizens who were the 'firsts' in their field, some famous and some less so. The event has been planned by Miss Gilby, who leads on Personal, Health and Social Education (PSHE) and has helped the children think about the importance of equality for all. Look out for the report of what each class has been learning later in the newsletter and be sure to ask your children what they have found out - I am sure you will find out something new!

It was lovely to see such a high turnout at the 'Open Classrooms' on Wednesday and I hope you all enjoyed looking through your child's books and seeing the wonderful displays in the classrooms and around the school. It really is amazing to see just how much learning has been covered in not even a whole half term and I know the children will all welcome a good half term break! For the Reception Parents it was their first 'Open Classroom' and I know how excited the children were to share their Learning Patches and classrooms with you. Although 'Open Classrooms' are not an opportunity to have a detailed chat about your child individually, we are very much looking forward to meeting parents more formally at the Consultation Meetings next half term to discuss their progress in more detail.

Tuesday saw our Year 3 classes travel to the Chiltern Open Air Museum in Oxfordshire as part of their Stone Age topic. Luckily the weather remained dry and they had the chance to explore what Stone Age settlements looked like, and experience what life was like at this time through a range of interactive, practical activities. The children had an absolutely fantastic time and have been excitedly sharing their news and learning from the trip. Miss Gilby and Miss Hylands were so proud of how well the children behaved and represented us all. We must also say a huge thank you to the parents who accompanied the trip, we couldn't do it without their support and hope they all learned something new too!



Year 4 entertained their parents with their year group assembly on Thursday morning, celebrating their residential trip to Sayers Croft at the end of September. It was clear to see how much fun they all had as we heard all about their exploits, including the 'Tarzan swing' on the ropes course, the blindfold trail and building shelters that were strong, water proof and even bear proof! They sang campfire songs and showed us all how their confidence and independence has grown by having just a few days away. Thank you to the Year 4 team for planning the assembly.

Next week is our final week of the half term and we are busy preparing for our Harvest celebrations. Our Phase 1 Performances will be at 9.00 am for our Year 1 parents to watch and 2.30pm for the Reception parents, both performances will be identical. Space is limited so please only attend one performance. Phase 3 will be performing their celebration at 9.00am on Friday morning. We are asking parents to donate luxury food items from Monday of next week (16<sup>th</sup> October) which will be displayed in the atrium and then passed to our local branch of Age Concern to be made into Christmas hampers for elderly people living locally. In the past we have received some lovely letters from the recipients of the hampers so we know just how well appreciated they are.

Following the success of previous years, Phase 3 will be running a Harvest Fair for the whole school from 3.00 to 3.45pm in the playground, selling a range of seasonal produce and running some simple games for all the children to enjoy. Please support them by coming along and joining in the fun. All the proceeds from the fair will be donated to our local Foodbanks to support local families in need. We look forward to seeing you there.


Just a reminder that the school photographer is in school on Tuesday and Wednesday next week to take individual photographs and family groups so these will be available ready to buy before Christmas.



## Knitting for the 'Knitivity'

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

Throughout October at Southfield Park, we have had several whole school themed assemblies celebrating Black History Month and today we have had a special day dedicated to Black History Month. We started the day off with an assembly where all the children learnt about what Black History Month is and why it is celebrated. It was wonderful to see the children thinking so deeply about equality!

This year our theme was 'Firsts'. Many people know that **Barack Obama** is the first black U.S. President but over the course of history, many African-Americans have achieved major firsts, with little recognition. Each year group have been researching, learning and honouring the achievements of black men and women throughout history who achieved major firsts.

Here are some examples:



Year 2 learnt about Charles Drew who was the inventor of the blood bank. They then created their own peace wreaths.

Year 3 have been learning about George Crum who invented crisps. Year 3 then designed their own packet of crisps that had a flavour linked to Black History Month. E.g. 'Fairness Flavour'. They then considered what their crisps would be made from. E.g. 2 table spoons of equal rights.






Year 4 learnt about Nat King Cole, the first black male television host. They used laptops to research and then used word to present their findings. Year 5 have been learning about the first black female poet laureate, Rita Dove. Year 5 looked at examples of her poetry and they then wrote their own pieces of inspired poetry.

## **SCHOOL DINNER NEWS**

We have decided that we need to cut down on the amount of paper we are using in school therefore we have decided to do the school dinner preferences slightly different moving forward.

Parents will have a two-week window to notify the office of any changes to your child's meal pattern **PRIOR** to the half term break. Preference slips will no longer go home with your children and it will be assumed that your child will remain on their current meal pattern **UNLESS** you come to the office to complete a meal pattern change request form.

Meal patterns CAN NOT be changed once the children return to school after half term and they will remain on the meal pattern until the following half term.

Meal patterns for next term can only be changed using the correct form between Monday 9<sup>th</sup> October and Friday 20<sup>th</sup> October.

Changes to menu: the Wednesday roast will now be pork one week, followed by two weeks of turkey, as the catering staff are not happy with the gammon option. Also, on Mondays the Year 5 & 6 children now have an option of a jacket potato with fillings. This is on a first come, first served basis, and the classes rotate who comes in first so everyone will have a chance to choose this option.

### **Reminders for Next Week**

## A STEP BACK IN TIME ...

On Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> October, Year 3 found themselves in prehistoric Britain – we had travelled back 12,000 years!



We had a fantastic day learning about what life was like in the Stone Age and the Iron Age. When we were in the Stone Age, we learnt to construct shelters, create fire using flint, make jewellery and make pigment using charcoal and fat. When we later arrived in the Iron Age, we prepared and cooked flatbreads, ground flour, made clay pots and whisked cream into butter and buttermilk.

Throughout the day, there was certainly much debate between the children (and the adults!) about which era they would most like to have lived in.

This trip has really enriched the children's learning experience, extended their knowledge and will have such a positive impact on our learning back in the classroom.

We were so proud of all of the children as they were *exceptional* ambassadors for Southfield Park. This was commented on by a number of members of staff at Chiltern Open Air Museum who were highly impressed with the children's behaviour, good manners, participation and enthusiasm.

We would also like to say a HUGE thank you to all of the parents who gave up their time to support us on our trip. Thank you to: Miss Brotherton, Mrs Florence, Mrs Hall, Mrs Myhill, Mrs Price and Mrs Winsor - we greatly appreciated your help.




